During the next 12 months we will be working with residents in a series of engagement activities to help develop ways to improve services and help people live at home for as long as possible.

Adult Social Care's vision has been developed in response to feedback about what matters to the residents of our borough.

Engaging with the adults we support, their carers and communities, alongside our staff, care providers and partners sits at the heart of everything we do. By listening we can gain valuable insight into the unique experiences of the adults who use services. Our Engagement Strategy sets out our approach to working together to plan, design, commission, deliver and evaluate services.

In memoon of Emily

REDCAR beach has been made more accessible for people with disabilities in memory of a little girl who struggled to get to the seaside.

Emily Matthews, who was just seven when she passed away last year, suffered from a rare brain condition which meant she needed 24/7 care and was not able to get to the beach.

In her memory, two Hippocampe wheelchairs and one Dubug wheelchair and hoist have been bought by the Council which can be hired free of charge by both children and adults.

Emily's family have been the driving force behind the project and her mum, Lindsey Shaw, unveiled a plaque to her at the launch event of the scheme.





Lindsey said: "Emily had a severe disability and neurological disorder which made her tube fed, epileptic, and needing 24/7 medical care. The hardest were the summer days both for Emily and her older sister, Shakila. Although we live in Redcar and love the sea, we couldn't go to the beach without a special wheelchair. We did a lot of other things as a family, even travelled in UK and abroad but we couldn't do what we wanted to do on our doorstep.

"I always wanted to fight not just for children like Emily, but for all people with disabilities. When this project came up, I

was asked to share my thoughts. For me, the wheelchairs are a start of something new."

The programme has been taken over by the Redcar & Cleveland Voluntary Development Agency, the wheelchairs being hosted by the Northern Renewable Centre and maintained by Route 1 Coffee House and Bike Maintenance Service'. There is a future ambition to expand the project to other beaches in Redcar and Cleveland. The beach wheelchairs can be hired from the Northern Renewable Centre, 39-41 Esplanade, Redcar, TS10 3AG, or booked by calling 07729 751561.



Day fit for a King! PEOPLE from across the borough

came together to enjoy the King's Coronation last month.

And surely no-one enjoyed it more than devoted grandmother Angela Peirson, who was chosen to attend the King's Garden Party in Buckingham Palace in recognition of her work supporting 'kinship carers' across the borough.

Angela is a kinship carer herself, meaning she looks after her grandchildren, but also helps a council-backed support group, Kinship Active, by fund-raising for special trips for the children, who are looked after by members of their extended family. Angela helps organise events including

therapeutic sessions.

"I think of myself as just a grandparent - but I must say it was lovely to go to the palace," said Angela, originally from Skinningrove, but now living in Redcar. "Princess Anne was there and William and Kate. I took my son and it felt very special."

Back home other events included a special screening of the Coronation on Redcar High Street followed by family films with people of all ages sitting on deckchairs and enjoying the spectacle. Kirkleatham Museum marked the occasion by exhibiting a 'fun take' on the Royal Mile, produced by

Community Stepping Stones. This included a 20ft x 5ft long 3D picture with Westminster Abbey at one end with King Charles and Queen Camilla, the Royal Carriage and a procession of guests behind. There was also craft activities and a picnic at the museum.

Cycling fever set to hit Redcar and Cleveland

THE BEST cyclists in Great Britain will be saddling up and taking to the streets of Redcar and Cleveland later this month when the British National Road Championships comes to the area.

The time trials will kick off the championships on Wednesday 21 June in neighbouring North Yorkshire, starting and finishing at the pit lane at Croft Circuit, near Darlington.

The action then hits the streets of Redcar on Friday 23 June with the circuit races, a technical 1km town centre circuit race starting on the seafront and then heading down the High Street.

The road races, starting and finishing in Saltburn on Sunday 25 June, will conclude the championships and challenge the riders with its steep gradients and hairpin bends.

Both the men and women will follow an 18.8km loop, with the women completing seven laps to cover 132km, and the men taking on 10 laps and 189km. Each lap will start by heading into the villages of East Cleveland, passing Skelton Castle, before heading through the old mining sites in Kilton. Riders will then drop back down to the coast at Saltburn before firing up Saltburn Bank to the finish.

A total of 10 coveted national champion's jerseys are up for grabs across the three days of racing from 21-25 June.

Great Britain Cycling Team rider, Charlie Tanfield, from Great Ayton, said: "There's a strong cycling culture around

here, and there's great roads so it naturally attracts cyclists from across the country. Since the Tour de France then the Tour de Yorkshire, people have been able to see what the area has to offer. I truly believe in my slightly biased opinion that there aren't any other regions in the UK that has as good roads and climbs to ride on!"

Watching from the roadside:

Friday evening, 23 June, will see the circuit races take place in Redcar town centre. Spectator parking will be well signposted and there are a number of car parks located at Kirkleatham Street, Seafield House and Majuba Road, approximately 5 - 10 minute walk from the start/finish.

The road races on Sunday 25 June start and finish near the bandstand in Saltburn. As a result, there are likely to be short delays for all road users, so do please plan your journeys carefully to avoid disruption. The multi-lap race will also be great for spectators who will be able to see the cyclists numerous times.

Please note there will be limited parking in Saltburn so we encourage spectators to plan their journeys and arrive early and also where possible make use of public transport. A park and ride facility will also be in place from Kirkleatham Walled Garden to Saltburn.

School is top class!

STUDENTS at Kirkleatham Hall School have been enjoying new facilities thanks to a £2.7 million extension.

The investment has allowed for the creation of a purposebuilt rebound centre, a new single storey extension for two new classrooms, a sensory/ therapy room, as well as doubling the size of the school's main hall, widening corridors and creating a new main entrance and reception area.

The school has been able to increase its capacity to meet the needs of its children and young adults who require a specialist provision, ensuring



that fewer pupils and their families have to travel outside of the borough.

Kirkleatham Hall School provides support to pupils between the ages of two and 19 who have a wide range of learning difficulties.

Headteacher Paul McLean said: "The purpose-built rebound hall will allow students to have their physical needs met through the implementation of specific physio programmes, alongside developing communication and the students' focus and attention. The new hall at the front of school affords

us the opportunity to once again eat together as a whole school community. It also provides us with a space to host events and shows and allows us to develop our role as the lead inclusion school for sport across the Tees Valley. The new therapy room will support children's physical and emotional regulation, helping them to be ready to engage and to learn. I would like to thank everyone involved in the project for their hard work and in helping us to make our offer to students even more effective."

The project has been funded by Redcar & Cleveland Borough Council, the Department for Education and the school.

Ian and Mandy's new foster role

WORKING in demanding jobs and running a busy home hasn't stopped Redcar family Mandy and lan Wagner becoming foster carers.

"It can be hard work...and it's not all baking cakes and buying flowers, by any means," smiles Mandy, "but we love it. To see the difference in some of the children, the smiles coming back, it's incredibly rewarding."

Ian, originally from South Bank, nods in agreement. "I have a fulltime job as an engineer at Alsom Transport down in Derby and


quite often have to go to other parts of the country. Mandy is a health care assistant in the neuro department outpatients at James Cook Hospital. We have four grown up children nearby, and grandchildren, including a fivemonth-old. So, there's a lot on. But it's really a lot like having a family - it just takes a bit of support and planning, although having a family support network is a big help."

Mandy, who has qualifications in counselling, explains that the couple have been fostering mainly teenagers so far in the

lan says the support networks from both the Council's fostering team and more experienced, foster carers have helped a lot. "They offer advice and reassurance. It takes time to get confidence, you think, 'am I getting this wrong,' and the support you get is really helpful."

Mandy again stresses the positive. "Even if you've just let a child be warm and safe for one night, that's worth it. But when you see them starting to smile, gain confidence...it's wonderful."

Addressing child criminal exploitation is a key focus for Redcar and Cleveland and the local authority has a clear list of actions to help achieve this which can be found on the authority's website.




Photography students put the area in focus

the world from a different perspective. She said: "I was really shocked to hear that I was the winner of the


"Paddy's Hole is a place I have passed many times while walking my dog and I love to take pictures down there. This is why I chose the location for the competition."


steps on Redcar seafront.

The Redcar Town Deal projects

taking shape

MULTI-MILLION pound projects set to change Redcar are taking shape. In 2020, the Redcar Town Deal was established and a board made up of industry experts, business leaders and community representatives was created. Alongside the Council, the board helped develop large-scale regeneration plans on how to make Redcar a vibrant, sustainable town.

The proposals led to £25 million being awarded to Redcar. These are the projects which are currently taking shape...



Clean Energy Education

Redcar and Cleveland College has opened the doors to its Clean Energy Education Hub.

Made possible by Town Deal funding, the new £3.2 million training centre will focus on giving people the skills to meet the demands of Teesside's growing renewable and low carbon sector.

The Hub will specialise in clean and renewable industry training for school leavers, apprentices and adult learners, including commercial courses, bespoke employer led programmes and higher education

It incorporates a new carbon capture rig, designed and built to help train and inspire the next generation of Net Zero engineers.



Coastal Activity Hub

Construction works have started on the build of a Coastal Activity Hub on Redcar's seafront.

British Triathlon, British Rowing and British Cycling - the National Governing Bodies for their respective sports – have all endorsed the project with a vision of bringing community activities and local, regional, and national competitions to the hub, including the Go Tri series.

The hub could offer the opportunity for local organisations to host a range of other exciting activities, sports and events such as beach volleyball, land yachting and running events, with local sports clubs and community groups already showing interest.

The Coastal Activity Hub will be located in a shipping container village that can be used as a meeting place and an informal base for clubs, school groups, activity leaders, families, or groups of friends.

The total cost of the Coastal Activity Hub project is £878,600 with £853,600 being met by Tees Valley Combined Authority and £25,000 via the Redcar Town Deal.





Nearly £25m investment is coming

to Eston

A TOTAL of £24.7 million worth of investment is coming to Eston.

Following the Government's Spring Budget, the Council received the news that the regeneration proposals for Eston, which were unsuccessful during the second round of bidding, will now be funded - granting £20 million to the area.

This funding, along with a package of funding from Redcar & Cleveland Borough Council and the Indigenous Growth Funding administered by Tees Valley Combined Authority, means there will be a total of £24.7 million dedicated to Eston.



The original bid put to Government last year included:

- £7.967m to help deliver the retail and commercial regeneration of Eston;
- £6.3m to help deliver a new pool for Eston;
- £1m for the wider regeneration of Eston Rec;
- £4.712m to deliver a sustainable and safe cycle/footpath route linking the Teesworks site to Nunthorpe with links to Eston Precinct and Eston Rec.

New library and community hall to open in Loftus this summer

THE transformation of Duncan Place in Loftus is nearly complete.

The historic building will soon open its doors to residents who will find a renovated and extended facility which will include a refreshed vibrant and versatile new Library space and a brand-new community hall.

Scheduled to open this August, there will be revitalised spaces for youth and family activities, including a Family Hub of services and activities for children, young people and their families aged 0-19 years (25 years with Special Educational Needs and Disabilites).

This means the original library at Hall Grounds will be demolished, and further planning permission will be sought to build a new car park on the site. If approved, this will be built in early 2024 and will provide up to 30 new spaces for the High Street and the nearby marketplace and businesses.

The Duncan Place project, worth £2.2 million, was jointly funded by the Government's Future



High Streets Fund and through the Indigenous Growth Fund administered via Tees Valley Combined Authority.

Overall, the Council has a package of £11 million for the Loftus Regeneration Masterplan projects.

Surviving and thriving

A MOTHER who experienced domestic abuse and used substances has told how an innovative scheme helped her start a new life.

Lesley, 39, was living in a refuge for survivors of domestic abuse when she found the courage to seek help.

She told her story by the side of Casey – from Intuitive Thinking Skills, who Lesley credits with helping turn her life around.

The pair are spreading the word about the THRIVE partnership which consists of the Council and three key organisations working together to support anyone whose life is affected by domestic abuse and/or substance use. The three charities are Harbour, which offers a range of services for those affected by domestic abuse, We Are With You, which supports people who want to make changes to their drug and/or alcohol use, and Intuitive Thinking Skills, which supports people through education to help them move on.

"Of course, I've been helped by all three of them," smiles Lesley, a mother of two grown up children. "The refuge made

me feel safe and the toughest thing I did was find the courage to get help for addiction for cannabis which was very serious for me, I couldn't do anything at all without it, or so I thought. They referred me to Intuitive Thinking Skills where I met Casey. It's not therapy there, it's not about your past mistakes. It's about self-help, changing thinking patterns making the right choices in future. The fact that we had Casey helped so much. She's bubbly and confident but she's been there too and that really helps.

"I had nothing - but now I have my own home, a job, a new, happy relationship and

my own coping mechanism my two doggies! I want to tell my story, not just because I'm proud of myself, and I am, but because I want someone else in a bad position to read it and know they can do it too."

Casey explained that she has lived experience of addiction from being a teenager. "This really works for lots of people, including me," she said. "We're proud to work with THRIVE and other partners so anyone who needs help need only tell their story once and any of us can step in to provide that support."

Orchard takes root

MORE than 100 volunteers have helped create the new Pippin Community Orchard in Kirkleatham, near Redcar.

The orchard, planted on the Donkey Field, has over 330 fruit trees, including cherry, pear quince and heritage apple varieties. This is also an important part of an even more ambitious plan to plant 19,000 trees across the borough.

The first trees in the orchard were planted with the help of schoolchildren from Kirkleatham Hall School and

Greengates Primary, in Redcar, who took the chance to learn about how important trees are for our environment. Pupils from Greengates Primary and Ings Farm Primary will take part in a pilot programme where they will learn about growing and caring for fruit trees. The young people will take part in practical workshops where they will graft their own fruit trees, which will be planted on the school grounds to create pocket orchards, or in the community orchard.

In time, an online database will be developed with information about each tree from the orchard, which

people will be able to access through QR codes to find out more about their heritage. The orchard will eventually include a tree that will be grafted from a pear tree which was planted by the Kirkleatham Estate gardener in the early 1900s, and still flourishes on the museum grounds today.

The varieties were created using material from the National Fruit Collection in Kent – one of the largest fruit collections in the world which is part of an international programme to protect plant genetic biodiversity. The





scheme is being delivered in partnership with a North East community company called Honest Graft, and the local community.

School rules! Mission to improve attendance

Making sure all our children get to school is crucial to giving them the best chance in life. We spoke to School Attendance and Welfare officer Danielle who is dedicated to making sure they do.

"WHEN you've worked with a parent, their child and a school and they're then working together to overcome any barriers to that child attending, and you know that child has a better chance in life it's just a great feeling."

So says Danielle, 36, herself a mother-of-two, who dedicates her working life to ensuring children who are missing out on their education get back to school.

It's a vital job with statistics showing that children with little absence from school are



nearly three times more likely to achieve five or more GCSE passes - but the North East has one of the highest school absence rates in the country at more than 8%.

Danielle explains that the reasons for non-attendance vary widely. "It can be health problems related to the parents or the child, a parent working shifts, a child being bullied at school, family dynamics...you name it. Every case is different.

"Part of my job might be early stages of working with a family and the school - although many schools have their own arrangements for this. It can be a simple matter that solves the problem, like being told about breakfast club, as well as talking to parents and carers about the impact of low school attendance and the legalities around it. We work closely with multiple other agencies and can refer to support services where this would be beneficial."

If the problem persists formal attendance meetings may be held by a senior officer in which the fact that it is the legal responsibility of a parent or quardian to ensure regular school attendance is made clear. "Even at this stage we find that a lot can be solved in a practical way by working together to put plans in place to improve attendance at school" says Danielle. "Legal powers are only used as a last resort."

Danielle explains that her team has had two reports that day whereby referrals from a secondary school to the local authority have resulted in the pupils going on to have a near 100% attendance rate which has been sustained. "That's a great outcome for those young people".

"It's so important to give a child, who in some cases may be vulnerable, their best possible chance. We always have the child in the front of our minds."

Held in the Bellamy Pavilion at Kirkleatham Museum, Redcar, the seventh annual Inspiring Women Awards saw the group of women recognised for their outstanding achievements.

Theresa Cave was named the winner of the overall Mo Mowlam Award, which was named in memory of the former Redcar MP.

Theresa, who also won the Lifetime Achievement Award sponsored by Cygnet Law, has worked tirelessly to prevent, and deter young people from carrying a knife or committing violent crime since her son Chris, was fatally stabbed nearly 20 years ago.

She has dedicated her life to the Chris Cave Foundation, a charity set up in her son's name to fight against gun and knife crime and to offer comfort and support to those across the UK who have lost a loved one to murder or manslaughter.

Theresa worked hard to bring the iconic 'Knife Angel' to Kirkleatham last year, a sculpture which is made from more than 100,000 seized knifes and blades and expanded her education programme to go into schools and colleges to speak to youngsters about knife crime.

In partnership with the Council, the project also inspires the next generation by providing school pupils with work shadowing opportunities


