Heading to the polls in 2024? – don't forget your photo ID

THIS year will be a big one for British politics. On Thursday 2 May elections of Police and Crime Commissioners will be taking place across the country, and it is almost certain that a General Election will also take place sometime this year.

Electors across the borough will head to polling complete the postal voting statement, cast your stations on 2 May to determine who will be the next Police and Crime Commissioner for the

Cleveland Police Force area and who the next Mayor of the Tees Valley Combined Authority will be.

Photo ID

For all elections in 2024, those who vote at the polling station will need to take an accepted form of photographic ID with them. This could be a British passport, a photo drivers' licence, or even your bus pass. Better still it doesn't even matter if the ID is out of date for its original purpose, as long as it has your current name on, and the photo still resembles you, you can use it. A full list of accepted forms of photo ID can be found at electoralcommission.org.uk/

voterID. If you don't have any photo ID, you can apply for a FREE Voter Authority Certificate at gov. uk/ apply-for-photo-id-voter-authority-certificate

Apply to vote by post

Will you be away on election day? Do you struggle to get out and about? Or would you just simply like the comfort of voting from your own sofa? Why not apply to vote by post or appoint someone to be your proxy and go to the polling station on your behalf.

Postal vote applications can now be completed online at gov.uk/apply-postal-vote. All you need is five spare minutes, your personal details including

your national insurance number and a digital photo of your signature. If you would prefer to appoint a proxy, an application to do so can be made at gov.uk/apply-proxy-vote

When voting by post all you have to do is vote and post it back to us! It is important that you use a Royal Mail post box to return your postal

> vote, as changes to electoral law mean that anyone handing their postal vote in at a polling station **MUST** complete a declaration form; failure to complete the form will result in the postal vote being rejected. The only Council building where postal votes can be handed in is Redcar Civic Centre, Ridley Street, Redcar, TS10 1TD. Please note that a form will have to be completed when handing it in. An individual can legally only hand in their own postal vote and postal votes of up to five other people. Anyone classed as a political campaigner, which includes candidates, agents, or anyone else involved or engaged in an election campaign is prohibited from

handling postal votes, other than their own and those of their immediate family.

Key dates for 2 May

If you have moved house or have never been registered to vote, remember to do so by Tuesday 16 April at gov.uk/register-to-vote. If you wish to vote by post, your completed application must reach us by 5pm on Wednesday 17 April, or if you wish to appoint a proxy, applications must reach us by 5pm on Wednesday 24 April. Applications for Voter ID must be made by 5pm on Wednesday 24 April.



popular family quiz. Seasonal events, kids' parties and disco afternoons are also organised throughout the year. "I'm from Boosbeck," says one of the volunteers, Paddy O'Rourke, 32. "Before our group took over the committee in 2017, the old volunteers

Post-Covid, bringing people together became their mission and that's how the pensioners' afternoons started. Every other Thursday, many pensioners from across Redcar and Cleveland gather at the Corus Club for an afternoon of fun,

Free day trips on a minibus, kids' themed parties, holiday events and movie afternoons are all part of the continuous efforts this group is making for their local community.

Lazenby Village Hall group

LIZ Robinson, 70 from Lazenby, has been involved in many community projects over the years.

Due to her connections with the village hall and funding from various organisations Liz, together with her husband Fred, family members and locals, are hosting weekly community events at the Lazenby Village Hall.

From bingo nights on Mondays, to the 'Soup and a Bun' dinners on Wednesdays and an eco-shop for Lazenby residents on Fridays, these gatherings give people a chance to get out of their homes, socialise, and enjoy a free delicious meal in a warm place.

'Soup and a Bun', their most popular event, runs every Wednesday from October until March between 12.15pm and 2pm. "Anyone is welcome," said Liz. "When we started, back in 2022, it was October, cold and miserable, the energy bills were going up and I thought it was a chance for people to get out of the house and come to a warm space to socialise."

Footprints in the Community

LOCAL charity Footprints in the Community has been supporting people in Redcar and Cleveland to help reduce poverty and isolation for more than 10 years. In November 2023, it joined forces with the Council to safety test small electrical items donated by residents to Dunsdale Recycling Centre, passing them on to families and people in need.

In the first three months, Footprints has helped 25 families with donations of kettles, lamps, vacuum cleaners and slow cookers. The electricals have been redistributed through their Redcar Area Foodbank, Next Step Shop and New Start projects.

Meet one of the volunteers

One of the people behind this is Dave Smithson. Dave has been a member of Footprints' project The Shed for around eight years and started volunteering more than six years ago. "It feels good to know that what we do helps other people. Everybody who accesses our services has been referred to us, so we know those people really are struggling."

Make a donation, help someone in need

IN November 2023, the Council launched a new scheme allowing residents to donate small, domestic electrical items they no longer use but which are still in working order to help those in need.

Since then 106 electric items have been brought to Dunsdale Recycling Centre to be tested and redistributed to the local community and 38 families and individuals have benefitted from the donations. The Council has teamed up with local community groups Footprints in the Community and Loftus CIC (Community Interest Company) which regularly collects the items, test them to ensure their safety, and donate them through their foodbanks and programmes.

Electrical items which are accepted include: toasters, kettles, blenders or food processors, lamps, slow cookers, steamers, sandwich toasters or small grills, hairdryers,

microwaves, air fryers, alarm clocks, coffee machines and irons. Donations can be brought to Dunsdale Recycling Centre any day without requiring a prior booking (if residents are solely bringing small electricals for this scheme).

Non-reusable devices such as e-cigarettes and larger electricals will not be accepted as part of this scheme even if they are still in working order.



All smiles for Mr P, the therapy horse

A MINIATURE horse is bringing smiles and laughter to elderly people in Redcar and Cleveland.

Mr P (for "Mr Perfect"), a 15-year-old American Miniature Horse, gives residents the opportunity to say hello to a friendly visitor.

Among the venues visited by Mr P was the councilrun Activities and Wellbeing Service at St Germain's Grange, attached to the supported housing scheme for elderly people in Marske – to the delight of tenants, day visitors and staff.

Visitors to the Activities and Wellbeing Service centre

reminisced about much loved animals they had had in their lives as Mr P calmly walked from person to person to be petted.

Katy Smith, who brought Mr P from her KL Pony Therapy and Events centre at Northallerton, said Mr P was the first of her miniature horses and she now has 11. She and her horses, which grow to about 38inches in height, have travelled the country to visit centres for the elderly, children's hospitals, universities and schools.

Dan's on cue for success

DAN Walker has won two international trophies with England's Pool Team this year... despite hardly playing any more.

Dan, a Career Coach in the Council's Employment and Training Centre in Grangetown, won a place in England's sixstrong A Team in late 2022 and the team have won both the European Championship and the wider Nations Cup this year.

But Dan, of Redcar, who works full-time and is the father of a sixyear-old girl, says he is so busy he hardly gets to practise.

He said: "I love playing and I'm really passionate about it but I don't actually spend much time playing any more. I have my little girl with me half the time and after work, trying to set up a new pool hall in Redcar and all the rest, it's hard to find the time.

"I'm the only one in the England team who works too. The others all have sponsorship and play a lot more tournaments and events than I can. So I'm really proud to make the team and help us win."

Dan, 31, started out as a billiard player at 15 in Redcar Working Men's Club boys billiards club every Sunday morning. He loved it and later switched to pool as it was more accessible.

"Teesside has the best billiard players in the country because it's still a game in working men's clubs," said Dan. "I still love the game but pool has more opportunities - although there's currently only one pool hall in Teesside at Stockton which we're

trying to fix. I also run the Redcar

pool league, which involves all the organising of fixtures, collecting subs, arranging presentation nights.

"The Nations Cup" was held in Bridlington and, as well as 11 European teams, teams were fielded from Mexico and Australia. Even the Shetland Isles had a team.

The European Championships were held in Malta with 12 teams fielded from Catalonia to Cyprus. Dan has also won the Redcar Pool League and had to go through a long qualifying process, first as a County player, before winning his place in the England A team.

As well as having limited opportunities to practise, Dan's chances to take part in tournaments are also restricted for financial reasons, although he did receive sponsorship and support from Redcar's Claxton Hotel, Carlin How's Cuts Exhausts and Tyres and Thornaby's Print & Press.

Inspiring young pe ople to succeed

TWO inspirational young people have told of their experiences growing up in care. Reece, 23, has told his story after winning the Champion of the Year award from the National Leaving Care Benchmarking Forum for his role in ensuring the voices of care leavers are heard.

And Bethan, 19, who works for the Council, explained she gives up her free time to contribute to the Regional Care Leaver Board to give a voice for other care leavers across the North East. Reece and Bethan tell their stories below:

Bethan, in her own words

I AM a 19-year-old care leaver, employed by Redcar & Cleveland Borough Council. From a young age, I was raised by my grandmother who worked in children's residential homes within Redcar and Cleveland. In my early Her hard work paid off teenage years, my grandmother I have now completed both my was diagnosed with lung cancer and then later diagnosed with Dementia. Because her care needs increased, I dropped out of school to look after her full time. Unfortunately, in June 2020, she passed away which meant that I was moved into foster care when I was 16.

A new, supportive family

I moved in with foster carers, who showed nothing but love and care towards me. They provided me with a stable home, a family and the drive to study for what I wanted. I began to study my A-levels at Middlesbrough College and, after liaising with a careers adviser, I was introduced to the term 'apprenticeships'. After further discussions about apprenticeships, I was offered a position within the Culture and Tourism team as a Business Support apprentice. I spent 16 months with a team who were so inspiring and helped me achieve so much. As well as working

full-time in my apprenticeship, I was attending Redcar & Cleveland College twice a week completing a Level 3 evening access course in Humanities.

apprenticeship and access course and am working in the Children's Education department.

I now live independently and am a voice in the Regional Care Leavers Board, which allows me to voice my, and other care leavers from our local

authority, opinions and what changes we would like to see from our Local Offer.

I don't allow being a 'care kid' determine where I want to get in life, and I will continue to work hard to get where I want to be.

REECE, who entered the care system aged just five, is taking an Open University course in Primary Education and praised the Council's Care Leaver Team (known as Target) for offering him support in the years since he left residential care. He has spoken about what support has worked for him...and what could be better.

He said: "The team at Target are amazing. It was them who helped me get on to the Open University course, providing everything I needed and they really do so much to help alleviate the loneliness that a lot of us feel when we go off on our own.

"I really support these new commitments and it is exactly right. That said, I'm not going to pretend a lot more shouldn't be done for care leavers and I bring this up whenever I can. Until you turn 18 when you are in care there are these relationships you have with staff and suddenly that stops. You don't see them any more and you get this sense of loneliness. There needs to be more preparation. When you

end up in accommodation it can be scary depending on who you are with. You don't always know how things work when you're setting up your own home." Reece added that many care-experienced people also needed support on how to build safe relationships. He said: "If you keep moving



from place to place, as I did, you get more and more unsettled. I was very lucky with the support workers I got in residential care

but I had dozens of foster placements and five schools. It's hard to settle down. Also, you don't always know basic, practical things at first like how to fix a plug or what to do if the electricity goes off. That's why these improvements at the Council and the support you get from Target, like the new app or the help you get to write CVs or when they make sure everyone gets a present at Christmas, can be so helpful."







The rest of the facility will still be closed while the operator fits out the container buildings and the final touches are made, but all external construction has finished so the loos are safe to use!

The facility will have toilets, showers, lockers, an equipment store and changing rooms.

The ambition is to attract people from far and wide to the area while giving Redcar and Cleveland residents a top-class facility on their doorstep.

The cost of the project is met by the Tees Valley Combined Authority and the Redcar Town Deal, funded by the UK Government.

Redcar and Cleveland's key construction projects -What you'll see in 2024 **Temperance Square in Loftus** This year, a single-storey building will be purpose

You will soon see major changes happening to the borough as key construction projects to take shape in 2024. This is what you're going to see this year:

Redcar Central Station

This spring, work will start on the transformation of the Grade Il listed railway station building. As well as rail facilities, such as ticket machines and travel information, the work will also deliver retail and leisure use as well as food and drinks outlets throughout the day and evening.

The project, which is funded by the Government's Levelling Up Partnership Fund, will not be complete until 2025, but residents will see progress this year.



Seafront properties will be painted

Redcar's seafront properties on Newcomen Terrace will receive a colourful facelift this spring.

The buildings will be painted in vibrant pastel tones to help to create an attractive and welcoming entrance to the town. This project is funded by the Redcar Town Deal.





Construction will start on the leisure attraction in Redcar

The former Goodwins and Marks and Spencer's buildings are due to be demolished.

Major reconstruction will take place throughout 2024/25, building an exciting new venue for family-friendly entertainment. The facility will provide residents with things to do no matter the weather, making Redcar a year-round destination.

This project is funded by the Redcar Town Deal.

Improvements will be made to Redcar High Street

In summer, you will see improvements to Redcar's high street with new planters, trees and benches, more landscaping. This is thanks to funding from Redcar Town information on Deal. Redcar Town Deal

built for training and working with relevant partners such as Jobcentre Plus and Beyond Housing.

Parking will be provided at the side at Newcomen Terrace where the building entrance is to be located, leaving the street facing (West Road) elevation surrounded by soft landscaping such as trees and a grassed area.

This is funded through Future High Streets funding from Government, Tees Valley Combined Authority and the Council, and should be complete by December.

United Reformed Church

Works have started on the transformation of the former United Reformed Church.

The derelict building, which dates back to 1906, has stood empty for more than 20 years, but the building will soon accommodate artist studios, a gallery and workshop space.



Coronation Park in Loftus In late spring, works to improve Coronation Park in Loftus will be complete, providing an attractive park for both local residents and visitors to the town. This is funded through Future High Streets funding from Government, Tees Valley Combined Authority and the Council.



Eston Pool

If planning permission is granted, construction will start in autumn on the build of a new swimming pool and learner pool as part of the existing leisure centre in Eston.

This will be a much-improved modern facility, becoming a place for residents to boost their physical activity, for families and friends to spend time together and see the return of swimming gala competitions.

The swimming pool will be complete in early 2026, thanks to Levelling Up funding from Government.



Bakehouse Square

Thanks to Levelling Up funding, work is currently being carried out to improve Bakehouse Square in Guisborough, including the lighting up of the Town Hall and new surfacing throughout. A TOTAL of 100 mature trees will be gradually planted in areas with poor tree coverage across Redcar and Cleveland.

The new trees, which will be planted on sites in Loftus, Guisborough and Eston, will help improve the regions' appearance, biodiversity, air, soil, and water quality and support residents' health and wellbeing.

Funding for the project was secured from the Forestry Commission's Urban Trees Challenge Fund by the Council in partnership with Tees Valley Combined Authority.

The Council also worked with Greengates **Primary School** and Ings Farm Primary School to deliver practical workshops – in partnership with Honest Graft where children had the chance to graft their own


fruit trees. Once big enough to be planted outside, the trees will create a small orchard within the schools.

Family's mission to help save lives

A FAMILY has made it their mission to save lives after losing a loved one to a cardiac arrest at the age of just 65.

Karen Davies has set out to install as many defibrillators as possible across Redcar and Cleveland in memory of her late husband, Steve, who suffered a cardiac arrest due to heart disease in various places across the in January 2022.

After losing Steve, Karen and their children, Sarah and Scott, made it their mission to help prevent other people from experiencing such a painful loss by fundraising in his memory to provide the defibrillators.

During his life, Steve volunteered for several local charities and organisations such as The Beavers, Clark Lister Brain Haemorrhage, The Sporting Bears and Forever 12. He had also coached junior football teams, managing Marske United for five years, as well as being a forest ranger at Flatts Lane Country Park and a steward at the Tour de Yorkshire bike race. Due to Steve's extensive connections both with local

businesses and charities through his volunteering work, the family managed to raise £9,000.

This sum allowed them to acquire eight defibrillators to date, each one of them having a commemorative plaque saying: 'A Gift from Steve, 2022'.

The defibrillators are installed borough, including York Road Caravan Park, Turners Mill Pub, Wilton Care Home, The Racecourse Wine Lodge, Lazenby Social Club, Scott's Chemist in Roseberry Shopping Centre and Javac UK Ltd in the Britannia Park Industrial Estate.

The most recent one can be found outside The Regent Cinema in Redcar.

Karen said: "We are one very proud family. Having a defibrillator installed at the Regent was an important achievement for me, not only because Steve and I loved going to the cinema, but also because this is a central location for public use. Hopefully, they will never be needed, but if they save one life, it will all have been worth it".

What goes in your blue recycling bin



The top 5 items mistakenly put in recycling

1) Plastic bags: Processing machinery does not recognise bags containing recyclable items. Please empty items into your blue bin and place bags in household waste bins. Alternatively, take plastic bags to your nearest supermarket that offers plastic bag recycling. 2) Textiles: These can be taken to Dunsdale Recycling Centre to be recycled.

- **3)** Food waste: Leftovers, even containers covered in food/grease, cannot be recycled and should also be placed in your household waste bin.
 - 4) Nappies: Not recyclable items. Please dispose of them into household waste bins.

5) Polystyrene: cannot be recycled. Please put it in your household waste bin.

Also a no: **Electricals/batteries Black plastic items**

Putting any of these items in your blue bin lowers our recycling rate as a borough, contributes to environmental damage and creates additional disposal costs, which could be better spent elsewhere.

Sign up for garden waste collection service

RESIDENTS in Redcar and Cleveland can now sign up to get their garden bin emptied in 2024 by visiting www.redcarcleveland.gov.uk/garden-wastesignup

The opt-in service, which will come into effect in April, will cost £40 for one garden waste bin to be collected fortnightly between April and November and £20 for each additional bin, up to a maximum of five.

If you have not already signed up for a customer portal account with the council, then you will be prompted to

do so. You will need to use your personal email address and your home details when registering. Your collection day for garden waste may not be the same as your current one. A permit and further information on a collection day will be provided at least seven days before your first collection.

The majority of local authorities, locally and nationally, have already made the decision to introduce chargeable garden waste collections amidst rising budget pressures. The Council agreed to the



garden waste subscription service last year to ensure that the service remained sustainable and will only be paid for by those households that choose to use it. The types of garden waste collected include grass and hedge clippings, leaves, plants and flowers, twigs, sticks and small branches, weeds (but not Japanese knotweed).

Could you foster?

REDCAR and Cleveland has seen a sharp increase in the number of children and young people needing a fostering home recently. These children and young people need foster carers who can provide them with a safe, secure, and loving home where they can thrive and begin to heal from the trauma they've experienced.

The Redcar and Cleveland fostering team has put together some Frequently Asked Questions for any residents who are considering fostering.

What is foster care? Fostering is looking after a child or a young person when they can no longer remain in the care of their birth family - this can be from a few hours to a few years.

Are there different types of fostering? Yes. Whether it's providing a safe home for a child in the middle of the night in an emergency, caring for a child for a weekend as a respite carer, providing a child with a short term home or caring for a child through to adulthood, there are many types of fostering that can fit around your lifestyle.

Can I work and foster? Yes.

Lots of our foster carers continue to work either part time or fulltime and foster.

Can I foster if I claim Universal Credit? Yes. However, it's important that you seek independent financial advice around how fostering might affect any benefits you receive.

I have young children- can I foster? Yes, providing that we are confident that you can meet the

needs of any child placed within your care alongside caring for your own children.

Can I foster if I'm not married? Yes. We welcome applications from people who are married, single, living together or in a civil partnership.

Am I too old to foster? No. You need to be 21 or older but there is no age limit to being a foster carer.

Can I foster if I am in a same sex couple? Yes. We are an inclusive service and welcome applicants from all sexualities and all genders.

We are passionate about providing local children with local homes. 
