Warm 'willkommen' for German friends

PREPARATIONS are under way to welcome friends from our borough's twin district of Troisdorf in Germany during October as the 35th anniversary of Redcar and Cleveland Twinning Association approaches next year.

Pamela Stenson, Chair of the Redcar and Cleveland Twinning Association explained that it is the first time that members of the Troisdorf group have visited in five years because of Covid.

It's hoped that sporting and other local organisations from our borough will consider joining the Association with a view to organising 'international' tournaments and

competitions.

The Saltburn Table Tennis group has already joined and represented Redcar and Cleveland in a tournament in Troisdorf last year. They are returning to Germany later this year. A chess tournament between the twin boroughs might also take place soon.

Pamela said: "We're looking for any organisations who might be interested in maybe organising future competitions to get in touch."

Troisdorf is a district similar to our own with a proud industrial heritage and areas of great beauty made up of 10 small towns.

Deep RNLI bond celebrated at Kirkleatham

A PHOTOGRAPHY exhibition exploring the motivations that drive volunteers to risk their own safety to save lives at sea has opened at Kirkleatham Museum.

Photographer Michael Sreenan, of Redcar, has created the display which celebrates the RNLI during its 200th anniversary.

The exhibition is called Let Not the Deep Swallow Me Up and explores the motivations that drive RNLI volunteers to risk their own safety.

Michael, Portrait of Britain winner in 2023, explained that he aims to evoke a sense of connection and storytelling through his work. He said: "I set out with the aim of finding out what drives these volunteers to do these incredible things. As the project went on, it changed a bit as I discovered how deep the bond is between the RNLI and our community here."

Proud fishing family tell tales of the sea

CARMEN Marcus, a proud daughter of one of region's oldest fishing and lifeboat families - the Thompsons - has told her family stories of the sea in support of the RNLI exhibition.

The Thompsons, who can trace lineage to the family of Captain Cook, are one of Redcar's oldest families from the time the town was really just a few fisherfolk cottages. They have served on

lifeboats of the Tees since The Zetland, the world's oldest surviving lifeboat, first set sail from Redcar in 1802 - when the crew was summoned by drum on rain-lashed, windy nights.

Today Carmen is working on a PhD at Teesside University about gathering seafaring stories in the area and will be involved in further exhibitions and workshops this year.

Carmen, a writer, tells more stories of her family and the community of South Terrace where so many Redcar fisherfolk lived. She explains how her Uncle Jim felt compelled to look out to sea very early on New Year's Eve, 1972, and saw a flare - a boat in severe distress. He and friends rescued a friend, Tony Young, and another fisherman, on the Daisy Ellen, a boat named after Jim's mother. More than 20 years later Tony found that boat in a breaker's yard. This time he came to the rescue and bought and restored the boat and she can be found back in Fisherman Square today.

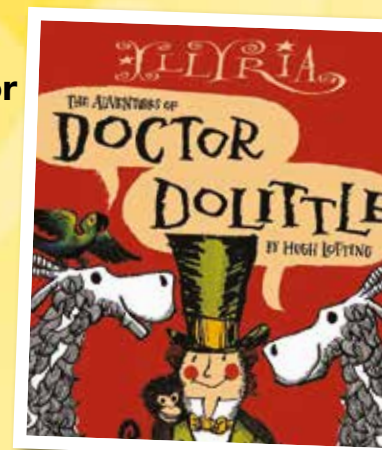
Presented by the History Wardrobe Collection, the exhibition opened in March runs until 22 September. Entry is free. The museum is closed on Mondays.

Big night for our community heroes



COMMUNITY HEROES: Unsung heroes celebrated at special Mayor awards

HEROES who work tirelessly for their communities right across the borough have received recognition awards from the former Mayor, Cllr Malcolm Head, in a special ceremony.

A total of 19 individuals and groups received recognition at the annual Mayor's Community Achievement Awards held at the Civic Centre in Redcar. The winners, all nominated by councillors, were:

1 Saltburn Valley Garden Volunteers

The volunteers, currently numbering 12, come together every week to support the reclamation of the unmaintained Saltburn Valley Gardens, on behalf of the Saltburn community and to aid the Council in returning Saltburn Valley to a well loved and cared for community area, reflecting its history and providing access to the local environment for residents and visitors.

2 Coastwatch Redcar

Coastwatch is a team of voluntary watch keepers and trustees dedicated to saving lives by supporting the Coastguard. It is part of the Sea Safety Group, which has stations along the east coast and is operational year-round. These selfless individuals not only offer immediate assistance to those in distress, but also play a crucial role in monitoring shipping vessels, reporting environmental concerns, and alerting the authorities to suspicious activities. They also

recently received the Kings Award for Voluntary Service.

3 Hilary Greenwell and Becky Peirse-Pallister

Hilary and Becky are both Ladies of Steel volunteers. Hilary has volunteered at the vitally-important youth club for 17 years and Becky 10 years. Between them they have given almost 3,000 hours to the children of Dormanstown. They play games, enjoy arts and crafts and talk to the children with kindness and compassion, a shoulder to cry on if needed.

They teach boundaries and social skills and have earned the respect of the children and parents alike.

4 Paul and Shirley Profit

Paul and Shirley had an idea to create a community garden and allotment for the elderly residents – to help those who are not normally able to engage or go outdoors. The "Good Life Community Project" was born with two allotment sites at Warrenby. They offer a safe space and free workshops to Dormanstown

residents, using their own vehicle to pick up and drop off residents who can't make it on their own. They have sourced funding to expand further, with a classroom hut being built by local residents.

5 Richie Kerr-Morgan

Richie helps to run the new Eston Market as a volunteer, organising and doing the admin, and also helps run charity events. He has also set up a wellbeing afternoon in a local café to support mental health.

6 Eston Remembrance Committee

The committee consists of veterans and members of the local community. They work with the military, emergency services, cadets, youth groups and local schools to organise an annual remembrance parade. Two murals have also been produced with ideas from the local community, designed and delivered by local artist Phil Meadows, and funded by local businesses. The committee created a memorial garden in Eston Square and worked in partnership with Falck to have a defibrillator fitted in Eston Square.

7 Whale Hill Community Centre Volunteers

The volunteers have been serving the local community for the past 40 years. They work 365 days a year to feed people from their daily food deliveries and food bank. The centre has a 'warm space session' and a 'remember when session' which brings in vulnerable and elderly people. There is also a mental health group for young people, as well as bingo and a community choir.

8 Joe Parker and Justin Holt from Grangetown,

The Grangetown United Community Hub provides thousands of children, young people and adults with the opportunity to enjoy activities, to celebrate family and community events and receive much needed support. Joe and Justin help carry out maintenance jobs such as mending and painting fences and keeping the outside area clean. They also recycle old furniture, repairing and updating it, making it

affordable to the community. The money is then reinvested back into the project.

9 Abi Hedges of Blank Canvas

Blank Canvas is a Christian organisation based in St Hilda's Church. They work mostly with 11 to 16-year-olds within the Kirkleatham area, offering a space to do their homework after school, with warm food. They also run a youth club and seek to identify the barriers that young people are facing every day and hopefully equip and support them to overcome them. Abi and her team are doing so much to give young people a better chance.

10 Lynne and Stephen Nicholls

They say all good things must come to an end and, sadly, this is the case with

Coastal View & Moor News. For almost 14 years, the East Cleveland area has enjoyed this publication, full of local news and information, delivered free of charge to the door. No one can deserve their retirement more than Lynne and Stephen. They are two local heroes who have kept East Cleveland on the map.

11 Elizabeth (or Libby) McDonald

Libby is an outstanding member of the community. For years, she's been committed to keeping Eston, Normanby, and the Eston Hills clean. She goes out most days on her own, with a bag and grabber in hand and picks up rubbish. She's also very involved in the community in Normanby, particularly with the Neighbourhood Action Partnership meetings. She's very supportive and genuinely

gives her all for the betterment of the community.

12 Saltburn Athletic (Junior) Football Club

Established in 1998, the club was founded by four local police officers, three of whom are still with the club, Chairman Dave Sadler, secretary Andy Croll and under 13s coach Tim Raynes. The aim was to offer youngsters a healthy and safe local pursuit, make new friends and develop themselves in a pressure-free environment. Over the years, numbers multiplied, and the football club now has teams, aged from under 7 to under 14, as well as a starter group called "little kickers".

13 Sharon Newsome

Sharon has been heavily involved in many community projects and groups. She has held the position of committee

secretary for the Friends of Skelton Wildlife Pond, dedicating huge amounts of time and energy volunteering to help regenerate the wildlife pond and surrounding area. She is also a volunteer for 1st Skelton Scouts, a volunteer director of Redcar Junior Parkrun and a volunteer for the local litter pickers.

14 Skelton Villages Civic Pride

The group has a weekly coffee morning in Skelton Civic Centre with cakes and savouries made by volunteers. The weekly coffee morning is well attended, particularly by older residents and helps combat social isolation. Funds raised by the coffee morning are used to buy spring bulbs and summer flowers for tubs around the Skelton villages. Volunteers from the group plant up the tubs and weed them and generally care for them.

15 South Bank Events Group

The group are volunteers who put on affordable events for the community of South Bank. They include Easter parties and games, best of British afternoon tea, summer carnival rides, and Halloween and Christmas events. All are organised by a small, dedicated team focused on giving the best value for local residents.

16 Tees Valley Women's Centre

The centre is a pioneering grassroots project which is a one stop-shop for women in a safe non-judgmental environment. It helps support the wellbeing of women, improving their quality of life by supplying one-to-one support, advice and guidance, training,

and education, along with employment opportunities, to help tackle social exclusion.

17 Glynis Rodgerson

Glynis Rodgerson has given decades of care to some of our most vulnerable people. The 82-year-old received the award for her work with residents at Marske Hall, near Redcar, where she has helped raise thousands of pounds and has helped with many activities and much more. As a young mother, she opened her home and heart to foster 62 babies prior to them being adopted, many of whom she has kept in touch with over the years. Glynis's citation said: "She is a real inspiration and an amazing support to our community."

18 Ged Burns

Ged has volunteered at Marske Hall for 10 years and is one of the most active, reliable, and well-loved volunteers at the home. He drives residents on holiday, to appointments and events, supports them in activities, befriends residents for one-to-one support, helps with the gardens and is a key member of the fundraising committee which has generated thousands of pounds.

19 Seaside Sid

Seaside Sid is the brainchild of Debi Large, from Marske. The character brings a smile to everyone's face, be it as a mascot at the football matches, at the Christmas parade, fundraising for Marske United and even gaining Marske national media attention when training for and running in the Mascot Gold Cup at Wetherby Racecourse. Seaside Sid has merchandise, a Facebook page and even appears in videos.

Space in our hearts and in our home to foster

EAST Cleveland couple Nikki Hart and Gillian Dove have told how the space they have in their hearts and in their home inspired them to become foster carers eight years ago.

"We foster because we want to make a difference to the lives of children and young people and give them a better start in life and we have the space in our hearts and our home," explained Nikki.

Now the couple, who are currently fostering a teenager and a baby, are encouraging anyone thinking about becoming a foster carer to get in touch with Redcar & Cleveland Council's Fostering Team.

"Sometimes it is the hardest job in the world, but it is the most rewarding thing we have ever done," said Nikki. "Just go for it," was her advice to anyone considering becoming a foster carer.

"Seeing a child smile when they have been with you for a few days

and you haven't seen them smile before is especially rewarding," added Gillian. "The fact that they feel safe and loved in our home makes it all worthwhile."

There are also challenges with being a foster carer and Nikki explains how difficult it can be to say goodbye when you have fostered a child for a while. "We had one baby for 15 months and it was really difficult to say goodbye to her."

The couple said they feel supported by the Council's Fostering Team and are committed to fostering children from their local area. "We receive great support from the Council including regular meetings with our supervising social worker as well as the reassurance that the fostering team are always at the end of a phone if you need them," said Nikki. "We live in the area, and it seemed like the natural thing to foster locally and the support the Council offered

was important to us."

Nationally, there is an increase in children and young people in care. In Redcar and Cleveland, our children and young people need foster carers like Nikki and Gillian, who can provide them with a safe, secure and loving home.

WE want to showcase and support the fabulous volunteers who make a real difference in their communities.

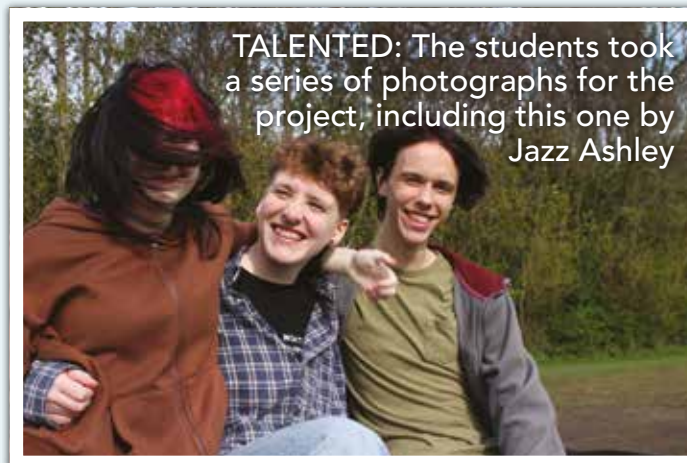
Some of the local heroes have been captured by A-level photography students from Prior Pursglove College in Guisborough, in a photographic competition.

The building will function both as a leisure and retail hub, with food and drink outlets, as well as a key transport link.

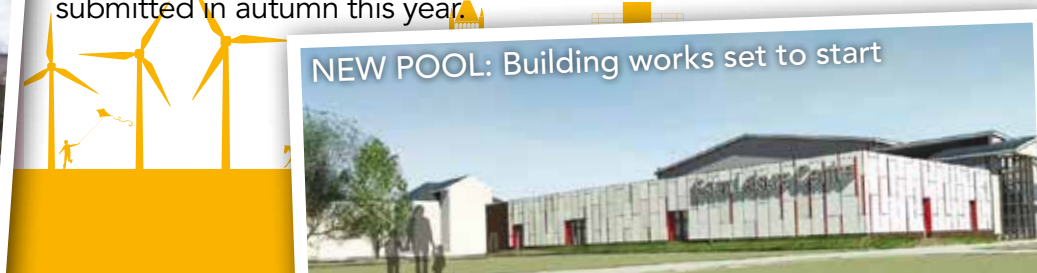

Work to start on Eston Pool

CONSTRUCTION works are set to start in September to build the new swimming pool and learner pool in Eston. The new facility, which is designed to Sport England specifications, will provide a 25 metre, six lane pool with changing areas, a 150-seat spectator gallery, an official's room for gala use and a Changing Places facility which can be accessed via a new lobby. The facility will also include a separate learner pool, welcoming children and young people to learn how to swim. The pool will be complete in early 2026, thanks to funding from Government, the Council and Tees Valley Combined Authority. Progress is being made on plans to redevelop Eston Precinct. Designs for the project are currently being pulled together and will be included in the planning application which is expected to be submitted in autumn this year.

"TTE's reputation within the industry is second to none in the way in which they prepare young people for the workplace and this new facility will open up a world of training and skills opportunities for people across the area."

Courses which will be hosted at the new centre will include a range of programmes for school leavers, adults, employers and international students. Subject specialisms at the site will include Mechanical Engineering, Electrical, Instrumentation, Process and Wind Turbines.

The centre will help TTE continue to provide high quality TTE apprenticeship programmes to a wide range of employers across the North East. Short courses it will host will include Electrical Safety, Hydraulic Systems, Virtual Process Control Room Operations, Safety Passport, Leadership and Management and many more.

parents gave me when I was a very young woman - they're all in here!"

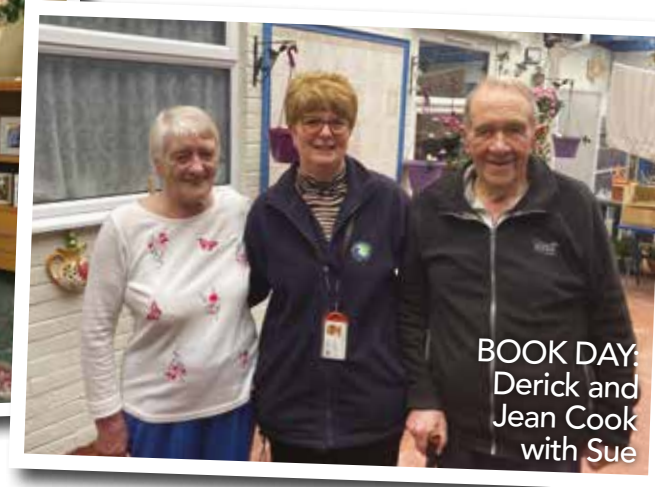

Janet's caring story

JANET Boland's husband Michael was just 55 when he was diagnosed with dementia. She has been caring for him full-time ever since. "I had to take early retirement to become his full-time carer back in 2021," Janet, 62, of Marske, explains. "It's a decision I've never regretted."

Soon after, Janet got in touch with social services to see what help was available, but she didn't expect the huge positive impact it would have on their lives. "I thought that if we got some help involved from the beginning, when he will need more help later on, it will become a normal thing rather than something thrown at him."

"Your needs as a carer are

taken into account as well as the needs of the person you are looking after."

Now, when Michael spends time at the day centre for dementia, Janet has the chance to do housework, meet with her friends and family and look after herself knowing her husband is in a fun and nurturing environment. "That way, on the days he is at home, we can go out and do things together with less pressure being put on me."

Through social services, Janet was put in touch with other organisations such as Whippet Up, Dementia

Action Teesside and Carers Together, which run regular activities such as dance groups or day trips for people living with dementia and their carers. This helped Janet and Michael find a supportive community of people going through similar experiences. "It's a way for us to socialise. By interacting with people going through the same thing, you get so much more peer group support and you don't feel like you're on your own."



These services offered them more than just activities, they provided counselling, help filling out paperwork and financial assessments. "There's lots of things you can get as carer to help you enjoy life more. Getting social services involved doesn't take away from your life, it gives you more life. You get more time to do something for yourself but also to do more things with them."

Time to talk about talking!

"YOU always make a difference...but sometimes there's these special, breakthrough moments," smiles Speech Therapist Iona Capstick.

"I always remember a five-year-old I was working with who couldn't produce 'f', I'd worked with him for weeks and weeks until, one moment out of nowhere, he just got it. He flew through the rest of the steps and soon was able to use 'f' words in sentences. It's the reaction of the parents that gets you!"

Iona, 27, is part of an expanded offer to support early language skills at our Family Hubs service which is providing more groups and services for children aged from newborns to young adults at rejuvenated centres across the borough.

She explains that there has been an increase in 200,000 children - not just pre-school children - not developing speech and language at the usual rate across the country, according to research published late last year.

"It may be related to Covid, but that's not certain," says Iona, a qualified therapist for five years. "One thing that is certain is nothing beats a parent or loving adult getting down to a child's level and chatting and reading - and that's a lot of what we do here. It's fun!"

"When I am working in the Hubs, I also spend time simply reassuring worried parents. But, where there is a significant need, the Speech and Language Service also provide more specialised help and I can always support referrals for more complex cases."

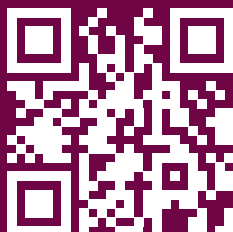

Sharon has recently completed her apprenticeship

and now she has a full-time position in Health Visiting within the Council's Family Hubs, her dream job.

"I'm really proud of myself and so is my family. I hope I've inspired my children to follow their passion."

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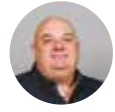
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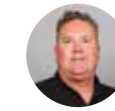
